Continuing the faith journey: KAIROS



Juniors at Wahlert Catholic are taking part in a life-changing, faith-building retreat that is causing staff, priests and visitors to notice the stronger focus on faith in students.

That retreat is called Kairos, and it comes at a time when students are looking for guidance and answers, have confusion about their future and face the hardships of their adolescent years. Kairos' focus on religion provides a community and space for students to grow, allowing them to slow down and detach from the things that pull on them daily.

Kairos is relatively new to Wahlert Catholic, having been introduced in the spring of 2012. The retreat is an experience for 35 junior students to take a moment away in "God's time" and raise awareness of the presence of God in all things. Throughout the four days, adults and peer leaders (seniors who attended the event the previous year) present discussion topics, and participants will have the chance to reflect in small groups.

The retreat provides juniors the opportunity to bond with classmates and know the worth of having deeper

relationships with others and with God regardless of where they are in their faith. During the retreat, students worship through daily Liturgy, Eucharistic Adoration and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Former Campus Ministry Director Michele Gelaude, who, along with former Chaplain Father Gary Mayer, started Kairos at Wahlert Catholic, said,

"The Kairos retreat experience is one of the best opportunities offered at Wahlert. Not only does the experience kick-start a person's relationship with God, but it gives them the opportunity to be confidently themselves, reflect on who they are and how they want to live their life. This is a package that cannot be beat."

There is a level of secrecy that is intertwined in the Kairos experience. It is not meant to be exclusive or controversial; however, it serves a purpose. The progression of the Kairos retreat weekend is extremely important. One of the most common sayings at Kairos is "trust the process." In order to trust the process, students cannot have a predetermined disposition about what they're going to

experience. One of the benefits of being on the retreat is having the opportunity to be open and let go of expectations. There are experiences that mean more to a retreatant in the moment when they are unexpected, rather than if they are aware and waiting for them.

Not only does the experience kick-start a person's relationship with God, but it gives them the opportunity to be confidently themselves, reflect on who they are and how they want to live their life.

When the weekend is complete, students often have a desire to continue growth in their faith. This takes place in many different forms such as leading the team their senior year, continued support for one another and their interactions on a daily basis.

Current Director of Campus Ministry Katie Koetz has seen the impact Kairos can have on students.

"I've personally witnessed the effect that Kairos can have on a person both at school and in their personal life. Many times the students come out of Kairos with a new perspective of the world. They have come to know what it means to be authentically loved and accepted as flawed human beings, and have practiced those truly loving and forgiving relationships while they are on Kairos. It's hard to be content with superficial relationships after that, so the hope is that they extend that love to all they interact with on a daily basis."

The Kairos retreat experience is one of the **best opportunities** offered at Wahlert.

An apologetics course was one of several ideas that emerged from the first Kairos (K1) retreat. "Why Am I Catholic?" is a defense of Catholic doctrine, as opposed to a debate or discussion of Catholic issues. The course is by nature "apologetic" and students learn the ability to explain and defend the doctrine of the Catholic Church.

Additionally, after K8 in the fall of 2015, students felt compelled to start a bible study that is held once a week after school hours. Students are proactively creating a community to continue their relationship with God and their peers.

Others are taking notice of Wahlert's Catholic identity. Several visiting priests have been impressed by the depth and spiritual growth in Wahlert students. Wahlert Catholic chaplain Father Alan Dietzenbach said, "What I'm seeing more and more is how our students desire what humans have always desired: real, honest, intelligent conversation, mentors and silence. Especially in our overstimulated and technological world, our students (like us adults) didn't choose to be this "connected" and they are drawn to experiences of resting in the presence of God, even while they still wrestle with their own faith. I was recently blown away by the depth of insight and blossoming of faith in students at both Wahlert and Mazzuchelli.'

Holy Family students begin their journey toward a powerful Kairos experience long before their junior years with faith-focused projects, curriculum and opportunities. Beginning in elementary school, students attend and participate in Mass and learn prayers and how to

incorporate their faith into their lives. Students at Mazzuchelli develop further what they were taught in elementary school and attend a semester-long class that focuses on the Catholic faith.

At Wahlert Catholic, in addition to Kairos, students are expected to take their faith to the next level through retreats, prayer groups, increased participation at Mass and more. Through these opportunities, students are able to build confidence in their Catholic faith, which prepares them for life after high school.

This resurgence of faith and Catholic identity at Wahlert Catholic and all Holy Family Catholic Schools has been spawned by religious instruction, opportunities to receive the sacraments and retreat experiences such as Kairos. Please feel free to join us for Mass at any of our schools or during Eucharistic Adoration held in the Wahlert/ Mazzuchelli chapel every Monday school is in session.



KAIROS VS. TEC (TEENS ENCOUNTER CHRIST)

While Kairos is relatively new to Wahlert Catholic, many alumni and current students are aware of Teens Encounter Christ (TEC). TEC is a three-day Catholic weekend retreat experience for high school seniors. TEC provides the unique experience for Wahlert seniors to meet other Catholic youth from throughout the Archdiocese who share similar questions, concerns and hopes about faith and life. While both Kairos and TEC provide the chance to reflect on their relationships with others and God, TEC differs in that it is open to seniors outside of Wahlert Catholic.



At age four, Kayla Banwarth picked up a volleyball for the first time, not knowing it would someday give her a chance to play in the 2016 Olympics in Brazil.

Kayla is currently a member of the United States women's national volleyball team, vying for one of the 12 spots to travel and play at the 2016 Summer Olympics in Brazil. She was part of the USA national team that earned the bronze medal at the 2011 Pan American Games and won the 2014 World Championship gold medal.

Long before her professional career, Kayla's passion for volleyball stemmed



from her parents, Thomas and Anne Banwarth, who were eager to teach her to play the game they loved. Her parents' passion and knowledge for volleyball came from collegiate and recreational play, as well as coaching, and made volleyball their life.

With natural talent and no younger teams to join, Kayla was the lone sevenyear-old on a team of 12-year-olds. Kayla attended Wahlert Catholic from 2003-2007, holding a starting spot on the volleyball team three of her four years. As time passed, she realized she had the opportunity to play beyond high school, so Kayla committed to play at the University of Nebraska. Her experience and talent now allow her to play at professional and Olympic levels.

We had the opportunity to speak with Kayla about her time spent at Wahlert Catholic, advice to other athletes and

Holy Family Catholic Schools: How did your Wahlert Catholic experience prepare you for where you are now?

Kayla Banwarth: My time at Wahlert

mostly taught me what kind of person I wanted to be. I grew up a lot in high school – both on and off the court. I was blessed to have amazing coaches, teachers and students who were major influences on the person I am today.

HFCS: What is something you would tell a student who is striving for a large goal?

KB: The reason I have gotten to where I am today is because I've worked my butt off. I've set goals. Big goals. But, big goals aren't going to be reached in a day. So, take it one day at a time. And for that one day at a time, do the very best you can and work HARD.

HFCS: Looking more at your goals, how do you set them?

KB: As I said, I like to set large goals first. For example, for a long time now my goal has been to compete in the Olympic Games. Having that goal in mind, I started setting smaller goals that would help me reach that big goal. Getting selected for rosters became a goal of mine. Earning a starting position became a goal of mine.

Winning World Championships and World Cup were goals. All of these little goals combined will ultimately help me reach my large goal.

HFCS: Are the Olympic Games your ultimate goal now?

KB: When this quad first started, my main goal was to make the 2016 Olympic Team. Obviously, I still haven't made the team yet. But, as the quad progressed and I realized that I was capable of making the team, I realized I REALLY want to win a gold medal, not only for myself, but for the USA Volleyball program. The US Women have never won an Olympic gold medal. I want to be able to write history with this special group of people.

HFCS: What is your biggest challenge, and how do you manage it?

KB: I'm very hard on myself, and that's true for a lot of other women on the team. So, we work with a sports psychologist, and one of the things we talk about a lot is positive self-talk. So many times we say negative things to ourselves that we would NEVER say to someone else. Realizing that we have control over our own thoughts is so powerful. But, like anything else, it takes mindful practice! I practice positive self-talk a lot.

HFCS: Who was most influential in shaping where you are today?

KB: My parents, for one, were very influential and gave me tremendous support. They taught me discipline and hard work all while supporting me through the ups and downs of both my career and life. Additionally, all of the people I was fortunate enough to play for as coaches at Wahlert and Nebraska, along with the people I met at college were tremendously influential in who I am todav.

HFCS: Should you make the Olympic team, what are you most looking forward to in Brazil?

KB: Listening to our National Anthem play, with my hand over my heart, knowing that I'm representing the people of Wahlert Catholic, the University of Nebraska, Dubuque, Iowa and all of America. Representing all of these people I've carried on this journey with me.

COACH'S CORNER

Tom Keating, former Wahlert Catholic Head Volleyball Coach, had the opportunity to coach Kayla her freshman year. We asked Coach Keating for his thoughts on her success and their memories.

Holy Family Catholic Schools: What did you see in Kayla that set her apart?

Tom Keating: Kayla has a unique personality that allows her to be a fierce competitor and a poised leader. In all the years I've known Kayla, I have never seen her get rattled even in the most stressful situations. She is a loyal teammate and her focus is always on finding a way to help her teammates (collectively and individually) succeed.

HFCS: How did Wahlert instill and reinforce values that led to her success?

TK: For all of the success Kayla has enjoyed, in club, high school, college and at the Olympic level, she has remained grounded. She understands that her talents come from God and that it is her responsibility to develop those gifts so they benefit others. She is an incredibly humble woman who understands the importance of faith and family. She is a woman of integrity who has the admiration and trust of coaches, teammates, opponents, officials and anyone else she interacts with. I would like to believe that her time at Wahlert helped her build the foundation for all of this.

HFCS: What would you tell students today who have hopes to achieve at higher levels such as the Olympics?

TK: First, it can happen. Kayla is living proof of that. Wahlert alumni have been all-Americans, won NCAA championships and played professionally. Second, it isn't easy but it's not supposed to be. It takes a level of commitment that few people are capable of. It takes understanding that failure is temporary and it is the best teacher. Third, it takes talent. Perhaps the most difficult thing in a young person's life is to figure out what his/her talent is and what God wants him/her to do with it. So…be open.

HFCS: Are there any special memories of Kayla you'd like to share?

TK: Kayla lit up the gym every day she came to practice or a match. The only time I've was Steph May's number and Kayla always wanted to be the kind of competitor that Steph had been for us. She'll never admit it but she almost cried she was so happy.

One of my favorite memories is traveling to Lincoln, NE to watch her play for the Huskers! So very, very proud of her!
